I am delighted to acknowledge:

Katrina Mannix – Chair of our Board of Trustees

and Jenny Gordon, Vicar for Education - tonight representing Cardinal John Dew, and the Archdiocese of Wellington.

Tonight serves the dual purpose of congratulating those young men who have, or who are to, receive prizes – fittingly acknowledged in front of friends and family for their achievements - congratulations, and also to farewell all our Year 13s on this last day of being together. It is then a night of celebration and a night of passage. Men – the ocean calls. It is time for the wind to now fill your sails and test their seams. Your ship has been safe in this harbour, but lingering by the shore is not what ships are for.

Last Thursday, being our last Tutor time together, 13GT had a little morning tea. I think most of our food complied with the school's Food and Nutrition Policy under the "occasional" category. Each of the 12 students reminisced humorously and sincerely about their time at Stream, particularly their highlights. Of course there was sadness too, as we had started the year with 13 students – we remembered Rhys.

Listening to the thoughts of those 12 students made me think about what a period of change each of you have experienced over your five years here.

We started 2012 with an enthusiastic commitment to positive respectful relationships and concepts such as Belonging, Gospel values, Pursuit of excellence and self-management – a commitment to recognising the dignity of all and a commitment to our interactions being mana-enhancing. As students you might have understood that as: we did away with detention. Imagine – five years at secondary school and not one of you has had a detention. Each Monday since February 2012 has started with a karakia – initially met with bemusement but now most students join in – it is what we do. Over your time here learning has changed significantly with new subjects timetabled – such as Samoan language, Social Justice and Robotics. Lessons have changed to primarily 90 minutes in length, and we now have or use terms or structures like:

- breakout spaces
- Study periods in which some students actually study
- a Common room
- google docs, google classroom, google forms, google sheets, google slides and, even, I believe, google hangouts.



We can write on desks and walls. To be fair students have for generations written on desks and walls – but this is now officially encouraged on whiteboard type material as an aide for learning.  
Our tutor groups are now smaller and just at one year level.  
It is increasingly common to study five subjects in Year 13 – like the rest of New Zealand – rather than six.

And a universally popular recent initiative – school finishing at 2.25pm on a Friday afternoon.

This year 50 of you are Student Leaders – compared with the 12 in your first year at school.

As finances allow the furniture is changing; you can represent Silverstream in rugby league and futsal and you can attend Mass during the school day – and on occasions many of you did.

In 2012 - your first year at Silverstream - as a College we cast off, steered the boat away from the safety of the shore and what we knew, to embrace the challenges of the open sea – to discover new things, new ways of providing for 21st Century students and learners.

When an organisation sets sail and embraces change it also realises that it will at times encounter rough seas – disappointments, uncertainty, times of seemingly little progress, becalmed. But lingering by the shore is not what ships are for.

Men – your part of journeying with your school is all but over. We will continue on our bearing – you now set sail for adventures in new directions.

I hope we have helped you to embrace change, which, ironically, is a constant, and in so much of life, rapid.

I hope we have encouraged you to aspire to greatness – not mediocrity.

I hope that each of you – alphabetically from Michael Allen to Jack Wright - will be courageous enough to lead great lives – in your own unique authentic way – whatever that may mean for you personally.

And in leading great lives – raise up others along the way – your brothers and sisters in Christ – to their personal greatness too.  
Be great – love others to greatness.

You sit here tonight in the Evatt Auditorium – named after Fr Leo Evatt, our third Rector.

At a prizegiving back in the 1940's he said of Silverstream:

*"Our task is to form men*

*Men who recognise the importance and dignity of the human person, understand the duties of justice and good will to all.*

*Men who will challenge materialism and selfishness.*

*Christian in heart, mind and conduct".*

That task has not changed. I hope that Silverstream has set you up well to be that sort of man.

# STAFF FAREWELLS



## Jonesy

Peter Jones, or “Jonesy” as both staff and students know him, is not only retiring from Silverstream this year, but also from the teaching profession. He has had a distinguished career teaching in the Hutt Valley at Upper Hutt College, Parkway College, The Central Institute of Technology, Heretaunga College, and Hutt Valley High School. Jonesy has taught mainly Accounting and Business Studies type courses over this time. He even taught typing back in the day on the old typewriters - despite not being able to type! Jonesy joined Silverstream in 2004 as Head of the Commerce Department and has taught Junior Financial Literacy, Business Studies and Senior Accounting over the last thirteen years.

Jonesy as a teacher has been living proof that a subject with a reputation for being boring doesn't have to be so! His Accounting classes were a combination of serious learning and good-natured fun and laughter. Jonesy is known for his sense of humour and the ability to transfer this to his teaching. He is also known as a very highly organised and hard working teacher who had very high expectations, both for his students

and himself. Boys appreciated this knowing he would do whatever it took to help them, as long as they were prepared to work hard. They also appreciated the speed at which he would mark and return their work, giving them valuable feedback and feed forward on their learning. Consequently in the thirteen years he has been at Stream, Accounting has been one of the most popular option subjects in the senior school.

It is no accident that Jonesy shares the same name as the All Black No. 8/flanker, his father naming his son Peter Jones in honour of the great player of the 1950s. Whilst Jonesy didn't achieve the playing honours of his namesake, he did inherit a deep and abiding passion for the game. At Silverstream, he spent many hours skillfully coaching and managing rugby teams each year, ranging from the U55kg to the 1st XV - and boys were always very appreciative of his efforts.

Jonesy may be retiring from teaching but we know he will be maintaining his busy life! He has a very strong sense of community and plans to take part in a lot of voluntary work, especially for his beloved Wainuiomata Rugby Club. Fitness is another passion of his so expect to continue seeing him running the streets of Upper Hutt! Jonesy will be seriously missed as a most skillful, dedicated, hardworking teacher and one of the teaching profession's real characters.

Howard was the manager for the third eleven hockey team which won their competition with his encouragement and motivation.

Howard has been an asset to the school and he will be missed by our Science Department.



## Peta Wilson



It was with great regret that the St Patrick's community learned that Peta had, with considerable reluctance, decided to retire.

Peta started at the College teaching RST, English and Careers in the last term of 2009 as a long term reliever. It's been our good fortune that long term relieving turned into a much more permanent commitment, and she returned the following year teaching RST part-time.

Subsequently, she started teaching Samoan language classes after school and at lunchtime, and four years ago it was introduced as a subject in the senior school as a multilevel Y11/Y12/Y13. The success of and interest in the Samoan programme meant that two years ago a junior Y9/Y10 option was also introduced. NCEA results have been impressive, and the Samoan programme has gone from strength to strength under her careful eye.

Her commitment to her students has always been paramount, and during her time at Silverstream she revamped the Pasifika group with Mike Cole. She introduced a BBQ to welcome new parents and students as well as a Pasifika prize giving at the end of the year to acknowledge Pasifika students' achievement and to farewell Y13 students who are leaving.

She organised a trip to Samoa in 2015 to familiarise students with various cultural practices and enable them to see places and visit places related to myths and legends they studied in class. That also gave her the opportunity to run an NCEA interactive assessment in an authentic situation.

Peta's contribution to Silverstream in her time here has been marked: it has been obvious in her passion for Samoan language and culture and in the caring support she has provided to all students especially Pasifika students. She is a person of great integrity and of natural dignity, and as an RST teacher her deep spirituality and knowledge about her faith have always been manifest and have enabled her to model and to live what she taught. We remember her as a dedicated teacher in the classroom, and as someone equally committed to the pastoral needs of her students. But we also remember her as someone with a great sense of humour and as a loyal member of the now defunct whiskey club.

Peta's intentions for 2017 are still uncertain but will definitely involve her becoming an international jetsetter. When she leaves, Peta will spend the first 6 months in England where she will stay with her daughter and travel to Europe. Then she will spend time with her other daughters in Melbourne and Auckland.

We take this opportunity to thank her most sincerely for her outstanding contribution to the life of the College and her commitment to the College's Marist values and we wish her all the best for her future.




2016 was another rewarding and successful year for the young men living in Redwood House. Again the boarding school was close to capacity and the boys had the pleasure of enjoying the surrounds and facilities of living and going to school at St Patrick's College, Silverstream. We had our largest Year 13 cohort with 18 and 14 of these being 5th year boarders. We also welcomed 18 new little brothers into Year 9. Mr Lloyd has been instrumental in the development of the spiritual side of the house this year with direction around prayer and reflection as well as organisation for Mass. It has been great to see this aspect of house life evolve significantly throughout the year. Mr Lambert has continued with providing the boys with training programmes and advice around the use of the Weights Room. We have also had the Hairy Barber visit regularly on Wednesday nights to provide the boys, and staff, with the latest cuts.

Academic results for 2015, out in January 2016, were outstanding and reinforced the benefit of compulsory study and the academic support of house staff and fellow boarders. 21/23 boys passed Level 1 NCEA with Carlos Byers, Jacob Clough, Jack Clout, Drew Cullen, Simon Goulden, Tawhiri Logan, Zane McAlister, and Xavier Seal all gaining Merit Endorsements and Connor O'Sullivan, Andrew Roberts, and Nick Smith all gaining Excellence Endorsements. Level 2 was a superb 100% pass rate with Josiah Bautista, Robert Griffith, and Evan McKenzie all gaining an Excellence Endorsement. Clinton Barton, James Hadfield, Marcus Jackson, Jacob Marriner, Andrew Stewart, Te Tahinga Whaanga-Davies all obtained Merit Endorsements. In Level 3 Malachai Wylie, Isaac Fa'alogo gained Merit Endorsements and Herewini Ammunson an Excellence Endorsement. 11 out of 13 boys passed this qualification. A lot of hard work went into these results with many hours utilised in study time and great academic mentoring by Mr Agnew, Mr Lloyd, and Mr Lambert.

As our Year 13 cohort departs it is important to acknowledge their contribution to Redwood House and the wider college. The way they supported the Year 9's through the tricky time of adjusting to boarding life was outstanding. 






# Commerce Department trip to New York

U.S.O.S. As a word in the Samoan language, this translated to English as a common term used at Silverstream as brothers. As an acronym which was introduced by 2016 Tongan and Samoan Head Boy, Albert Latailakepa creatively turned these letters into reading, “**United Sons Of Silverstream**”. With this integral concept in mind, this year looked to be a breath of fresh air for Pasifika students in different and unique aspects of the College.

Term One kick started with not only the first Pasifika SPC Silverstream Head Boy since 2009 starting his honourable role, but also newly appointed Deputy Rector, Mr Savali. From a Pasifika perspective, it was simply outstanding to see the movement of our Pasifika people within our College Community. In March this year 8 boys completed the Travers-Sabine Circuit as the final tramp for their Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award. This is a challenging tramp, with the boys carrying all their food and equipment for 5 days. The boys handled the challenge admirably and carried out their own navigation. We were very lucky with fine weather for the whole tramp. At the top of the Travers Saddle we stopped for lunch and some of the boys even had a swim in the lake! In September the Bronze boys completed a one-day practice tramp from the twin lakes at Kaitoke, to the Kaitoke forest park via Ridge Track. This is a good introduction to tramping for the boys, including checks of their equipment and learning how to put tents up correctly. We were again blessed with relatively fine weather. The boys enjoyed the tramp and had a fun evening playing "spotlight" in the campground and toasting marshmallows on the campfire. In October the Bronze and Silver groups went on a two night tramp in the southern Tararuas. We started at Kaitoke, walked up the Tauherenikau Valley and exited at Waiohine Gorge in the Wairarapa. The tramp was very pleasant, with sunny, calm weather for the whole tramp. The boys enjoyed swimming in the river and even caught and cooked an eel!

The boys learnt to prepare appropriately for trips in the backcountry, to navigate on the tracks, and to cook and sleep in the outdoors. They also learnt to respect their environment by not leaving litter and tidying up after themselves.





## Bronze Duke of Edinburgh (Hillary Award) Three Day Tramp

Months of anticipation had been building for what would be the ultimate test of endurance, bush and survival skills. From the moment we left the bus to the moment we got to the end of the track, we learnt things that can't be taught in classrooms. Resilience, mental endurance and persistence is required when tramping a marathon-like distance, over three days with 'houses on our backs'. Up steep ridges, over rough rocky ground, fallen trees, muddy ground, around potentially dangerous cliffs and through streams and rivers, the journey encompassed a tough portion of the Tararuas. For many on the trek, it would be their first real tramp through the dense NZ bush. Although I can't say speak for everybody, what I can say is that the tramp most certainly lived up to the hype.

Waiting outside the auditorium, there were a few nerves for some of the boys as last minute adjustments were being made. Our supervisors for the tramp would be Mr Clark, Mr Wilson and Quinn Plant (Gap student). Each boy would have to carry his own food and clothes for three days, a tough task even for the experienced trumper. We were separated into tent groups which made the load slightly easier. After torrential rain the day and night before, God was certainly with us as the spring sun was out in full swing. The bus rolled up and off we were, on a journey through nature. It would be a rare chance to get away from the stresses of modern day society and connect with nature. The tramp started with a brief talk from Mr Clark and was followed by the first group who explained the first section of the track. This year it would be important that the boys didn't 'follow the leader' but took initiative. The beginning was an early indication of what was to come. Half of the group were knackered after a few hours of tramping and this conveniently coincided with lunch. The group was able to get acquainted with the Canadian Gap student Quinn Plant who was luckily available as a last minute replacement for one of the teachers who was unable to attend the tramp. After some food and water, the boys were refreshed and ready to set off once again.

Finally coming to Smith creek shelter was relieving for many. The site we camped out at was very nice, just thirty or forty metres from the river, stones set up for a campfire and a log perfect for sitting on. A hard day's tramp was also a quick day's tramp, we had a fair amount of time before sun down at Smith Creek shelter to do what we wanted. Cooking our dehydrated meals, having a treat, climbing trees or catching eels... yes you heard right. Ironically it was Connor Eales that prepared the poor creature. It was surprisingly tasty. The teachers (and Mr Plant) had their coffee and read their books while us students played the typical playground game 'seesaw' on a makeshift device. Some students took enjoyment of jumping off while the others at the opposite end were at the top. Needless to say, there was some sore tailbones following this pastime. A fire is a typical camp enjoyment and with matches and abundant easy catching wood, it wasn't long until we had a roaring fire to sit in front of. After a long day's tramp and a nice dinner (for most of us), we were all pretty keen to jump into bed and catch some zzz's.

On the second day we awoke early for another few hours of tramping. We had to pack our tents quickly to make sure we got to Tutuwai before sunset. This walk was slightly shorter and would take us from Smith Creek shelter to just past Tutuwai Hut where we would set up our tents again. The tramp wasn't too difficult although there were some tricky areas including one cliff we had to try and navigate around. Once again, we'd had all the good weather so far and that even inspired a swim when we reached our destination. This didn't last long though and there were a few swinging tents when the wind started blowing. After another cooked meal, we snuggled down for the second and final night although it seemed like we'd been away longer than two days.


The last day's tramping, although not incredibly long, was quite possibly the most difficult with a steep uphill climb that lasted for an hour or two before an even steeper descent. But before this we passed an emergency helicopter landing pad and Cone Hut. Cone Hut is the second oldest hut in the Tararua's, built in 1945. Mr Clark informed us of the damage that had been done to the hut the year before which outlined to all of us how important it is to respect places such as Cone Hut which are open for all to use. This was a valuable lesson for all of us. After a gruelling climb and descent we crossed a 30 metre long swing bridge that was approximately the same distance above the ground. Once we crossed the swing bridge we were able to rest and it was like taking a huge weight off our backs ... actually we did take a huge weight off our backs. We had accomplished what we had set out to do a few days earlier and had conquered nature. The bus picked us up and off we were back home, back to civilisation.

The tramp couldn't have happened without the supervisors: Mr Clark, Mr Wilson and Quinn Plant. The boys were cooperative throughout the Tramp and persisted through tired legs and sore backs. We would also like to thank Mr Watson for coordinating Duke of Edinburgh and planning the Tramp.



As the HOD of this awesome department, I could not have asked for a more enthusiastic, positive and stimulating group of people to work with. I thank you sincerely.




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

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# CAREERS & GATEWAY



# MATHS

## What We Did Blow By Blow

Along with the rest of the school, we undertook the journey into 90min periods resulting in far more variation in lesson structure and use of smaller learning groups within classes. At senior level, with no BYOD, their have been challenges. Its fair to say 90 minutes is a long time in a mathematics class if there is no variety. The BYOD programme does provide that flexibility, and we look forward to the ongoing progress of BYOD across year levels.

Years 9 & 10, who have BYOD across their cohort, all made use for the first time of the Maths Buddy software, leading to more individualised learning. This resulted in less traditional note taking and teacher centered work. This programme should have been seen in action at home by parents. It gives boys the opportunity to study independently, and develop that skill to a level that allows them to take control of their learning. Nearly all boys have embraced the use of MathsBuddy, and we plan to keep rolling it out across the school as the BYOD use increases each year.

At the senior level we have deliberately challenged our students in Year 12 and 13 with a greater emphasis on traditional Mathematical topics, and have reduced our focus on what might be described as Statistics topics. If a boy is challenged, he will respond, if he has the skills. If we offer easy options, then a boy in general will lower his standards and take that option. We believe that approach does not provide boys with information as to how gifted they are as mathematicians or learners. We also offered boys only one attempt at Internal assessments in Levels 2 and 3. Not one boy complained. It meant they took the assessment given very seriously, rather than the default position of not being too concerned with their effort as they always could have another go.

Unfortunately, we lose Mr Mark Winfield to Onslow College on promotion to HOD Mathematics. His contributions to our department have been many indeed and he will be missed by staff and boys alike. Mark brought extensive experience from overseas teaching with him, (mainly in the UK), and uncompromisingly loved his subject. Mark loved creating tutorial videos for his students, many of which you can find on Youtube, so in a sense he will always be with us! He made use of his extensive programming skills, promoting Geogebra and many other apps found in the Google Classroom suite. With lots of energy and passion, Mark's students all respected his skills as a teacher, his humour and approachability.

I would like to thank the Maths staff not mentioned already for the significant amount they contribute towards your sons' mathematical progress: Tony O'Connor, Kirstin Stern, Jane Nolan, Nathan Beckman and Pat Hallot.

# MAORI TE REO



Early in Term Four Our Te Reo classes travelled to Hongoeka Marae in Plimmerton, Porirua. The tribe for this marae is Ngati Toa Rangatira. You may know them for the haka their Famous tipuna (Ancestor) composed, 'Ka Mate' which the All Blacks perform. Travelling with us were all the boys studying Te Reo, among them our Whaikorero man Luani Ammunson, Matua White, Mr Coles and two of the Gap students.

After the pleasant bus ride we proceeded onto the marae paepae, where we were welcomed with a traditional powhiri. They welcomed us warmly with lots of smiles. After the speeches and waiata were completed we shook hands and hongis with the tangata whenua (people of the land). After this they welcomed us into the Wharekai (dining hall) and we ate morning tea. A old ancient tradition of Maori people is manaakitanga. This simply translates to caring, and has been passed down for generations. They showed manaakitanga for us throughout the whole trip, especially because many of the boys hadn't been formally welcomed onto a marae before.

We took part in many activities throughout the day and all of the boys learnt heaps in our short time. Ki o Rahi is one of the only traditional Maori sports still played today, and it is great we had an opportunity to play it on our trip. I enjoyed this heaps. After Ki o Rahi the boys learnt some Mau Rakau. Mau Rakau is how our tipuna (ancestors) took part in combat with each other, with wooden taiaha (war sticks) to fight with. We learnt some simple moves and how to walk and move with a taiaha. The Tangata Whenua were really informative and told us stories about how it came to be. Afterwards we ate lunch and then proceeded into the wharehau to listen to a kaumatua (elderly man) speak to us.

All in all it was a great experience, many of the boys hadn't been onto a marae before so it was also a learning experience for many. It was a privilege to learn about these people and the whanau of this marae. On behalf of all the boys I would like to say a big thank you to all the staff of the marae, I would also like to thank everybody involved in the organisation of the trip, especially Matua White.

On Thursday March 26, I witnessed probably one of the most courageous moments by any musical group in my teaching career.

Eight Silverstream men from Years 9 – 13 walked out onto the cavernous stage at the Te Rauparaha Arena in Porirua to compete at the Regional Barbershop Competition in front of hundreds of young barbershop singers and audience and 16 judges sitting only a couple of metres in front of them. There were twice as many judges as there were singers in our Barbershop. We were the smallest group by four times, the next smallest had around 40 members in it. We were also the youngest group in terms of the time we have been together as a choir, just a term and a half. All of the other schools competing have a very long tradition of competing Barbershops,

longer in fact that some of our boys have been alive! They have also been rehearsing since this time last year. Yet, with all that stacked against us, our Magnificent Eight walked out onto the stage in their shiny new waist coats and bow ties (the only boys school not in school uniform) and they owned the stage with their two songs. They performed "An Irish Blessing" and "Coney Island Baby" with confidence and showmanship and with pride and they very obviously enjoyed themselves and in the end, that's all that matters. ## Wellington Band and Orchestra Festival

Each year Stream organises and hosts the Wellington Band and Orchestra Festival, a national festival open to school and community Concert Bands, Orchestras, Big Bands and Jazz Combos. Although promoting and focusing on bands and orchestras in the Wellington region, WeBO is open to any band or orchestra from around New Zealand and the world.

In the last 4 years we have had ensembles travel from as far away as Dunedin and Auckland to participate in WeBO and we have had over 1000 musicians perform on our stages over that time. Our adjudicator and clinician Dr Rich Roberts loves the festival so much, he travels all the way from Washington, USA just for us! We cater for every type of group from a 10-piece beginner primary school band, to a recreational adult jazz bands to 100-member symphony orchestras.

Two weeks ago, on August 13 during the torrential downpour, 400 musicians from around New Zealand descended once again on the Evatt Building and performed on our stage. It was one of the best Festivals so far with full audiences and a great festival environment for everyone who was there.

# PHYSICAL EDUCATION

2016 was an exciting year for the department. A new Head of Department was appointed and we built on the previous year's foundations to improve the students learning in this subject. This year we tried to go as 'paperless' as possible, removing all workbooks for junior classes and using their BYOD devices and Google classroom to enhance their learning. This was incredibly successful and something the department is looking forward to developing over the coming years as we move forward with technology and adapt to the changing times.



With some swimming pool issues at the start of the year, our Senior Multi Sport day had to be cancelled but it will return for 2017! A highlight of the junior programme was the successful aquatics programme where the students had access to five lessons delivered by an expert swimming coach. This all came together with a highly successful aquathon after school where the majority of boys competed and achieved their personal goals. The junior students continued to be taught by the one teacher for all three areas of our curriculum strand. This helped with continuity and consistency across the year with a real focus on improving their health and well-being by showing connections across the three individual areas, Physical Education, Health and Food and Nutrition. As a school we are fortunate to have such impressive facilities and access to technology so we are able to deliver a modern and innovative curriculum to our students. It is fantastic to have two high quality gyms, and see the students use these facilities recreationally. The classrooms also enable the department to deliver innovative lessons. The teachers within the department are focused on the challenge of upskilling their technical knowledge as technology continues to evolve.

## Enhancing Performance

The Department's Enhancing Performance programme is an option subject, selected by senior students. In 2016 our students have covered a wide range of topics, tailored towards developing their individual knowledge, understanding and skills across Food and Nutrition, Health, and Physical Education. Each course aims to provide greater insight into personal health development as well as some basic employment requirements of each respective area of the Health and Sport and Recreation industry. Highlights from this year have seen our students study; Hauora and its dimensions, implement goal setting strategies to improve their participation rate within physical activity, research human anatomy and apply their knowledge to exercise techniques, and demonstrate their competence of practical sporting skills.



## Senior PE

Senior NCEA PE has continued to deliver a varied and interesting programme for our senior students. The boys learn a lot of theory concepts through practical sessions and apply these to real life sporting situations. Within Senior Physical Education, the department regularly use iPads and apps to deliver informative lessons. Two members of the department attended a professional development course resulting in technology being used in the department for the remainder of the year. It is exciting to see how this can be developed over the coming years.

One goal the department had for 2016 was to raise literacy standards across the three curriculum strands. The staff worked together on professional development and were very grateful for the expert guidance from the English department in developing literacy strategies. This certainly assisted with upskilling the department and hopefully this will continue in 2017. Literacy and developing critical thinking are key areas for the department to further develop as we strive for our students to aim for excellence and hopefully aspire to achieving Scholarship Physical Education.

## Year 10 Food and Nutrition

Year 10 Food and Nutrition was an enjoyable experience filled with great people and even greater food. You acquire and apply new skills, not just around making a meal. The classes cover a wide range of topics, allowing you to create meals from all around the world, and all around the menu. The year started off with limited resources, where we were taught how to give ourselves a proper meal instead of opening up the fridge, staring at everything and yelling "there's nothing to eat!" We then moved on to cultural foods, which allowed us to take our taste buds on a trip to tantalizing new levels of flavour. Not only that, but we also got to learn about the culture, and why they make the food they do. It's history, geography and food all in one! The year was rounded off by sports nutrition, where we learnt what we should and shouldn't be putting into our bodies to bring us to peak performance. It's great for a budding sports stars to see what the 1st XV has before a match. I would definitely recommend it.

## Year 11 Food and Nutrition

Year 11 Food and Nutrition in 2016 was a fantastic year for the class, who were keen and enthusiastic to learn by Inquiry. Our first internal was on Food Safety and Hygiene which was a useful life skill to have but also to help with all of our practical classes so no one could get sick. The second assessment was about Societal Influences, which made us realise how our daily food choices are so influenced by the environment that we live in. Our last internal was a combination of our external learning on information from packages and nutrients that fuel our adolescent bodies. The Inquiry learning as opposed to traditional teaching was a different way of learning which suited some students more than others, but we all enjoyed our learning in a great environment.

## Year 12 Food and Nutrition

Wow! Where to start! What a year we have had. This year we've covered many exciting and interesting topics in and out of the classroom! The year started with a Unit Standard focusing on food safety methods within a business. We created a wide variety of foods and drinks revolving around our primary focus this year "making the right food choices for the right reasons in a food safe way". We developed a great understanding of what certain foods and drinks do for and to our bodies. We did this by going through practicals and learning what type of foods require the correct treatment, and why.

Mid way through Term Two we took on the challenge of analysing the beliefs, attitudes and practices related to a nutritional issue affecting families in New Zealand. For our class this was a great insight to the communities around us. We gathered information and used it to find the main issues around Food Insecurity.

Term Three was by far, from my perspective, the most interesting! This term we took on the challenge of choosing an athlete/sportsperson in who we could interview over the course of three weeks regarding things such as - their trainings, their eating patterns/diets, and the way in which they deal with societal conflict in relation to food choice. From the information gathered we then had to write a report based around how the athlete/sportsperson lives their life. We then could suggest ways in which they could improve this in order to improve their performance.

Finally on behalf of Level 2 Food and Nutrition we would like to thank Mrs Potts for all of her continued hard work throughout the year, and for sticking beside each of us even when she had things going on herself. We would also like to thank Ms Brown for her hard work also during the year when Mrs Potts was away at university.



# ATHLETICS

Athletics in 2016 was notable once more for the effort first and foremost from the Year 13 leadership of the middle distance and sprinters. These guys took responsibility for us having a team that was worthy of Stream, and did this by their own example. We were strong at Old Boys' and McEvedy in these areas. I salute these guys, in particular Max Press, Jacob Minshull, Hamish Tustin, Liam Kennedy, Liam Carson, and Jared Sarten who all targeted strong performances for the school, by working hard in training and pushing themselves in lead up competitions.

2016 was noticeable for two things – our ability to hold our own on the track, and sadly our demise in the throwing events, with, for the first time in the last 23 years, no Stream senior shot-putters capable of turning out for the school. Why exactly this happened is not clear, but for a school that prides itself on its power based sports ability, to not have two seniors who could throw over 12meters was unbelievable. We have in most years had guts hitting over 14m, with nationally ranked throwers most years. This demise certainly was a blow to the Athletics team, with our senior discus and javelin also very below par.

This result has seen us actively look to engage better with the throws, namely by connecting boys with the Wellington shot put coach, Shaka Sola. Shaka has taken a role with the Junior Sports Institute, and has taken a few of our talented juniors under his wing. This is just a start. For a country with the best shot put results at the Rio Olympics, we have at Stream a way to go to get back on track.

As the year comes to an end the record will show we lost Old Boys' – again – and came 3rd at McEvedy - again. It will not show the work many boys put into representing Stream at these events, with some getting little recognition. It also is time to recognize the imbalance between schools that live 1km from Newtown Park and those who live 32km away. Our arrival to train at Newtown Park with a minibus of 10 athletes is always a little daunting when we find around 20 to 30 from each of our competition schools already there and training. Luckily, we know we can match them in ability, but it takes more than that.

Jacob Minshulls appearances in the Senior Boys 100m and 200m Finals were outstanding, and his 5th and 7th placings show his ability to compete at the very top in NZ. Mention must also be made of Stanton Renwicks who missed the Junior 800m final by 2 places, and Max Press who similarly missed the Senior 800m final by 2 places. We farewelled a group of dedicated and talented Year 13's at this meeting. Max Press, an outstanding athlete in his time at Stream, leaving with a 1min 56.1 800m PB and school record, Liam Kennedy an Open Stream school record holder in the 1500m, Liam Carson a 3k record holder in the U14 grade, Jared Sarten a fine all round middle distance athlete, and Jacob Minshull as mentioned. These boys will be proud of what they have contributed in their time at Stream. Mention also must go to the staff who have supported the team over the years, namely the ever supportive Mike O'Leary and Rob Tungatt, along with the positive support of late from Peter Woods and the legendary Rob Ackerman. We also appreciated the support of Nigel Martin, father of Daniel, on the nats trip.





## Town Traditional

The second Traditional of the year was to be played at Stream against arch rivals Town. Fine weather saw Stream batting and looking to post a positive first up score. None of the top order looked comfortable on a pitch that was moving around and regular wickets saw Stream quickly fall to 100/8. Opener Boyle remained stoic at one end (41) and combined with a quick fire innings of 44 from Henry Fraser Stream struggled through to 159 when Stream declared hoping to seize the opportunity and bowl on what was still a challenging wicket. Stream needed to bowl well to have a chance and made a solid start with Town at 37/3. From this point on the Town batsmen began to grind out their innings and combined well with solid partnerships throughout their innings to get through to 252 all out early on the second day giving them an overall lead of 93. Stream did well to contain Town and give themselves a chance thanks to outstanding efforts with the ball from youngsters Max Griffith (5/58) and Tobias Meyrick (3/54).

Stream was going to need to bat with more authority in the second innings if they were to get back in to the match. Stream's run chase began just as badly as the first innings and with only a defiant 47 from keeper McLachlan, Stream were bundled out for just 115 late on the second day. With Town resuming on day three and requiring just 22 runs for victory the match was over early with Town taking the Traditional comfortably.

## St Bedes

The last of the season's 3-day Traditionals saw Stream pitted against St Bedes, a match Stream had not won since 2012. Stream were keen to get the trophy back but St Bedes looked to seize the initiative and after winning the toss decided to bat. The move looked to have worked with St Bedes batting strongly to get through to 247 all out late on day one. Bowling honours were shared with 3 wickets apiece to opener Max Griffiths and left arm spinner Caleb Alosio.

Stream started their run chase early on the second day with many of the batsmen making solid starts but with only Josh Tainui managing to kick on (46) Stream were bundled out for 183 giving Bedes a lead of 64. Whilst not the lead Stream were looking for it kept them in the game with just over a day to go.

Stream stated strongly in the hunt for early wickets having Bedes 3/3 in just the 3rd over. Tight bowling and an inspirational change late in the innings to introduce Jonno Tuffin saw Bedes bundled out for just 90. We struggle to retain our top players as they succumb to outside pressures from clubs and academies. At the same time, college football is becoming increasingly competitive as schools develop academies and relationships with clubs. We need to look at how we can best meet the interests and demands of our players whilst maintaining positive and productive relationships with the football community.



The First XI Hockey team had a young squad yet again with a number of new players in 2016 after losing a core group of 4 Year 13 students from the 2015 team. The team had a successful year overall competing in the top Premier One Wellington Competition and the top national tournament in New Zealand, the Rankin Cup. The team achieved two best ever results for a Silverstream First XI Hockey team, finishing an impressive 3rd at the end of the round robin section of the Premier One Wellington Competition and finishing a place higher than the 2015 team did at Rankin Cup, securing their place at this tournament for 2017. Some memorable performances for the boys include coming back from 3-0 down to beat Paraparaumu College at the Kapiti Turf, being undefeated against Rathkeale

College both home and away and a fighting 5-3 loss against a quality Wairarapa College team, the most goals scored against the eventual winners of the Wellington Premier One Competition. The team's ability to deal with travelling long distances for the majority of games on a Friday night was particularly impressive again this season. The team attended the Rankin Cup for only the second time in Silverstream history and competed impressively in every game; this is more impressive considering the small size of the Silverstream squad and the amount of junior boys in our team compared to the other big schools. Some highlights of the tournament were a strong first performance against Wairarapa College where the team had a 4-3 loss against the team that ended up finishing 2nd in the tournament.
